

Life of Archie

We like the barbecue. But even if we didn't, we'd still probably eat there.

This is how our family feels about the Oklahoma Joe's in Broken Arrow, Oklahoma, which sits just off the interstate in a bland, newly-constructed shopping center that doubles as a Bass Pro Shops parking lot. I know, I know, not exactly Rendezvous, Payne's, or Central on Central. Memphians like us usually require a little more character to our rib shacks, but we keep going back to Oklahoma Joe's in the strip mall.

We make this trip on the years when we visit Andrea's extended family in Kansas for the holidays. During our first visit we were greeted by a man bussing tables in dark pants with a pressed shirt and tie. He warmly asked us where we were from and treated the girls like he was their grandfather. He struck us as surprisingly hospitable for a guy cleaning tables. After we were finished with our meal we spoke again and he wished us a safe trip. We got in the car and discussed how kind he was. We even speculated that he might be the owner or manager. Who else would treat guests so well?

During subsequent visits we've learned the real story. Archie Ford (62) has spent the past seven years working at Oklahoma Joe's. He's cooked, washed dishes, and done every other job. But that's not why people know him. Visitors recognize Archie as the one cleaning tables in the dining room, where he doubles as their guidance counselor, social worker, minister, and friend. He takes away dirty trays and even prays with hurting diners. During our last visit he sat at our table and told us about his late wife. They were married 32 years before her 2017 death. He says that he has dedicated every day since her passing to treating others as well as she treated him. I can't think of a better way to pay tribute to a beloved partner. He's doing a pretty remarkable job.

Archie is a reminder that there is no such thing as an insignificant job. All work can matter since God is the one we ultimately serve through our work (Colossians 3:23-24). Archie also reminds us that we aren't all called to the same work. Some work in hospitals; others drive trucks. Some style hair; others teach math. Some build engines; others create apps. Our calling as a church is not that we all imitate Archie by doing what he does. Instead, we imitate Archie by doing whatever God has put in front of us.

This is why I hope you'll take today's Ministry Fair as an opportunity to consider your ministry here. How can you take the things you are able to do and do them for God's glory and the growth of the Kingdom? There are good things happening, but so much needs to be done. Maybe you will take this nudge as God's suggestion that you could step up and lead. If we are going to be a church for everyone we'll need everyone's help. We need some Archies.

I'm so grateful for our shared ministry. I hope you will continue to find strength and hope in all of your work. The things you are doing matter here at COCWS. They matter to our community in Memphis. Most of all, our work matters to God. Thank you for what you are doing and for what you will do.
